The Charleston Convention—Will the Southern Democracy Press Loyal to the South?

The time for the holding of the Democratic National Convention draws near, and the hour for the South to look the hand which will be presented to them at Charleston boldly in the face, has already arrived. It is useless for us to shut our eyes to the palpable fact, that Squatter Sovereignty (that stupendous form which the Black Republican Lucifer has taken) has many ardent supporters within the Democratic Camp, and that the detectable dogmas will have

many false and unscrupulous advocates at Charleston: in word, it is certain, and it is well for the South to know, that she may be prepared for the issue, that the insertion of a squatter sovereignty plank in our platform, or what is the same thing, the nomination of Senator Douglas, will be energetically urged by every possible argument; threats of a defection in the North will be used, promises and protestations of loyalty to the South will be made, and all else failing, it will be attempted stealthily, but no less fatally, to incorporate it in the Democratic creed under the disguise of a compromise.

In view of this emergency, what action should we Democrats of the South take?—We do not pretend to anticipate and determine the policy of the Southern Democracy in a given contingency, but we do acknowledge the possibility, may—if the Southern Democrats are not true to themselves and their section—the probability of such a contingency arising, and believing this, we would earnestly counsel the utmost caution, and a fearless determination to maintain in the Convention, at every hazard, their plain Constitutional right to protection for their property in the common territory of the Union. Let the people, making the master into their own hands, look well to it, that none but men of the sternest loyalty to the South be sent to the Convention. Let the masses in primary meetings and district Conventions, instruct their delegates to present a bold and uncompromising front to Black Republicanism, in its new phase; and then we will go to the Convention with a unanimous South, entrenched behind the truth and holiness of our cause, and powerful in the unity of our nation, and there we will reason calmly, yet seriously, with those who dare our right, and if they be indeed erring but conscientious Democrats instead of Black Republicans in disguise, they will listen and desist; but if the majority of the North, taking advantage of, and exercising an usurped and unjust power, should, unadvisedly, of our remonstrances, persist in a war upon our honor and interest, and insert a squatter sovereignty plank into the Charleston platform, and place upon that platform a squatter sovereignty, let it be done under the solemn protest of the Southern Democracy, and let us reserve the privilege of thinking and acting for ourselves in the premises.—The Northern Democracy, all powerful as they are in Congress, would do well to be warned in time, and beware how they present to the South the alternative of squatter sovereignty or desertion of the Democratic party.
