Mr. Douglas and the Tariff. The Tariff is a very confused and incoherent report of Mr. Douglas's remarks at Reading, Va., and particularly those about the Tariff. Mr. Douglas said: "Who can deny that for the last four or five years Congress has utterly failed to perform the duties for which it was created."
