W.M. NEWS.

The war news this week is by no means as favorable and cheering as we could wish. In consequence of the exchange of prisoners at Chattanooga by Gen. Bragg we have been able to learn a very little from that scene of great interest at the present time, but sufficient is known to show that it is not very favorable. The fact that the enemy may have succeeded in getting and holding possession of this side of the river shows that they are not in a bad position as we had been led to believe. They are no longer in a state of siege, as they are now enabled to get provisions to their army. The enemy claims to have possession of Lookout Mountain. This is not true, but they have possession of Lookout Valley. That our readers may understand the topography of the country around Chattanooga, we publish the following from the Richmond Dispatch:

"Just in front of Chattanooga is a bend in the form of a horse-shoe, the toe of the horse pointing south. On the east and on the south side of the river Chattanooga is situated. To the west of it, and at a distance of two miles, is Lookout Mountain, which runs down to the river. Along the base of the mountain runs the railroad, which crosses the river about twenty-five miles below. To the west of Lookout Mountain lies Raccoon Mountain, and between them lies the Lookout Valley, a creek running through the middle of it. The Yankees, who last night left Chattanooga in pontoon boats, floated down the river, without being hailed by a single sentinel, so far as we can learn, landed and occupied Raccoon Mountain, almost without resistance. They have thrown bridges across the river, and are constantly receiving reinforcements in that direction. Hood's brigade, under the command of Gen. Jenkins, failed to dislodge them the other day but failed. The battle will be fought in the Lookout Valley and its vicinity."

We were informed on Saturday evening by a gentleman who came to us from Millboro, that Col. Wm. L. Jackson's forces fought the enemy under Gen. Averill, supposed to number between five and seven thousand, at Mill Point, in Pocahontas county—that Col. Jackson was reinforced by Gen. Echols on Thursday night, but that they had to fall back in the direction of Lewisburg, owing to a column of the enemy threatening their rear from the direction of Gauley Bridge. On Saturday evening a telegraphic despatch was received here from Gen. Samuel Jones stating that Gen. Echols and Col. Jackson had been defeated with great loss. The Lynchburg Republicans, which went to press on Saturday night, say:

"Authentic reports were received here Saturday, that a bloody battle was fought Friday, near Lewisburg, in Greenbrier county, betw. Gen. Averill, with 7,000 men, and Gen. Echols, commanding the Confederates, with about 2000. The great disparity of numbers between the opposing hosts, made it necessary for Gen. Echols to retreat after a fight of two hours, in which he is reported to have lost very heavily in killed and wounded."

If this is true, the enemy now have possession of Lewisburg. General Imboden was on the march to reinforce Echols and Jackson, but it was impossible for him to get there in time to render assistance in the fight which is reported to have occurred on Friday. It is hoped that he will form a junction with Gen. Echols in time to render valuable assistance.

On Saturday last two of our brigades on picket on the Northern side of the Rappahannock river—Hoke's North Carolina, and Hayes' Louisiana—were attacked by about 20,000 of the enemy. Our men fought well and killed a great many of the enemy, but were compelled to yield to such a superior force. Those of our men who escaped had to cut their way out and then to swim the river. Of about the 2,000, it is known that 600 succeeded in making their escape. The famous and immortal "Stonewall Brigade" had just been relieved from picket by Hayes' Brigade. If the enemy had succeeded in capturing that Brigade the Yankees would have burst every canon and broken every bell in Yankees in ringing bells and firing cannon in honor of the event.

On the evening of next day (Sunday) we returned the compliment by capturing, as reported by passengers on last evening's train, about 1,500 prisoners in a fight which occurred near Jno. M. Scott's farm in Culpeper. Thus at least, we have given them "the tick."

The following official dispatch was received at the War Department (Sunday):

NARRAGANSETT, Nov. 8.—The following has just been received from Bleedington: "Our cavalry, under Brig. Gen. Wm. E. Jones and Col. Gilmer, yesterday captured at Roanokeville eight hundred and fifty prisoners, four pieces of artillery, two bands of colors, sixty wagons, and one thousand animals. Our loss two killed and eight wounded." (Signed.) R. R. KANSOM, Maj. Gen."

The enemy are still waiting an answer to Charleston without doing any more damage.

ENEMY DESTROYED.

THE LEGISLATURE—GOOD BILLS.

The statement we made last week that the Legislature had not passed any bill of general importance save the repeal of a law of the previous session, relating to the currency, did not do full justice to that body of nobles, for they did pass three very good bills besides the one to which reference was made, to wit: The bill for the supply of grain to the families of those in the military and naval service, and the bill prohibiting the consumption of grain by distillers and other manufacturers of spirits and malt liquors. The following is an extract from the last bill mentioned:

"An act to prohibit Distillers for the past three years the Confederate States District Court, Judge Hulburton presiding, has been engaged in the examination of ten men, from Rockingham county, charged with aiding and abetting and piloting deserters from the Confederate army to the Yankees lines. These men know nothing respecting as Geo. Yates, Samuel Wheelinger, George Cooper, David Cooper, (father of the above,) and others of a like nature. The court, however, has found no evidence to sustain the charge, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined for every man, one hundred dollars, and be subject to imprisonment in the county jail, not exceeding six months at the discretion of the court. No person, or company, or association, may contribute to or receive from any distiller, or any other manufacturer, or any other source, any sum whatever, for making, or aiding, or assisting, or procuring, or causing to be made, any whiskey or other liquor, or any article which may be used for the same purpose, or for any other purpose, or for any other object, or for any other reason, than the support of the Confederacy, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined for every man, one hundred dollars, and be subject to imprisonment in the county jail, not exceeding six months at the discretion of the court.
