Now, 4 erefore, I. Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, do hereby recommend to the People thereof, that they do set apart and observe the first Thursday of December, next as a day of the first Thursday of December, next as a day of national thankgaiving to the Creator of the uni-verse for these great deliverances and blessings. And I do further recommend that on that occa-sion the whole people make confession of our na-tional sins against lis infinite goodness, and with one heart and one mind implore the Divins gui-dance in the ways of national virtue and holiness.
