MINNESOTA. The homestead not exceeding eighty acres, and the dwelling house thereon and its appurtenances, not included by the owner thereof...

NEW HAMPSHIRE. The homestead of a householder, to the value of five hundred dollars, which exemption extends to any interest the debtor may have in a building occupied by him as a homestead...

TEXAS. The homestead of a family, not exceeding one hundred acres of land, or any town, or city lot, or lots, not exceeding two hundred dollars in value...

NEW YORK. The lot and building thereon occupied as a residence and owned by the debtor, being a value of one thousand dollars. Such exemption to continue after the death of such householder...

NEW JERSEY. The same homestead exemption to one thousand dollars in value, as in New York, with similar provisions, except that no release or waiver of such exemption shall be valid...

ARKANSAS. For all debts contracted since December 31, 1855, one hundred and sixty acres, or one city or town lot, with all the improvements without reference to the value.

MAINE. The property of a householder or head of a family, consisting of a lot of land, dwelling house and outbuildings thereon, as shall not exceed five hundred dollars in value...

VERMONT. The homestead of every householder residing within the State, consisting of a dwelling house, outbuildings, and the lands appurtenant thereto, occupied as such, and the yearly produce thereof to the value of five hundred dollars.

OHIO. The family homestead of each head of a family, not exceeding five hundred dollars in value, while the debtor, the widow or any unmarried minor child resides therein, though the homestead may be built on land owned by another.

MISSISSIPPI. A homestead of the head of a family, consisting of one hundred and sixty acres of land, with the dwelling house and implements thereon, or if in a city, town or village, the residence, not exceeding in value fifteen hundred dollars.

IOWA. The same homestead exemption as in Wisconsin, with similar provisions, except not to exceed five hundred dollars in value.

SOUTH CAROLINA. The dwelling house and house appurtenant thereto of each family, together with fifty acres of land, not included within any city or corporate town, to the value of five hundred dollars.

MARYLAND. The Constitution directs the Legislature to pass a law exempting property to the value of five hundred dollars.

ALABAMA. Forty acres of land, not exceeding four hundred dollars in value, provided they are not within the corporate limits of any town or city.

FLORIDA. Every farm forty acres of land, of which he cultivates ten, not to exceed two hundred dollars in value.

GEORGIA. Fifty acres of land to every white citizen, male or female, who is the head of a family, which includes the dwelling house and improvements, not to exceed two hundred dollars in value...

UTAH TERRITORY. The homestead occupied by the wife, or any portion of the family of a deceased person at the time of his death, shall be free to the wife and family of the deceased, and shall not be liable for any claims against such estate.

The Present State of the Indians.

In this article we shall confine our attention to the Indians of the United States and Territories, saying nothing of the same class in the British possessions in North America, or of others in Mexico, Central America and South America.

The population of this country is made up of several elements, we all know. There are native white inhabitants that, according to the last census, numbered about 16,000,000. Then come 3,000,000 of foreigners. Considering the last as not naturalized, we have 19,000,000 of citizens in full. These classes take an active part in Church and State. They are the active, influential power in the land.

What other civilized country in the world has such different and discordant elements? And if there is much confusion in the moral and political world around us, is it at all to be wondered at in view of the heterogeneous materials that compose this Republic?

the Seminoles have been removed from Florida beyond the Mississippi River, with the exception of the aged chief, Nam Jones, and a very small number of his personal adherents. And the tribes that now remain East of the Mississippi are chiefly found in the State of New York, Michigan, Wisconsin, and Minnesota.

In looking West of the Mississippi, we find the great Southern tribes in the Indian Territory, West of Arkansas, and Southern Missouri. These tribes of all others in the country, are possibly those in New York, are the most civilized and christianized. Scarcely any mission ever established in the world have been more successful than those among the Choctaws, Chickasaws and other tribes, by the American and Presbyterian Boards of Foreign Missions. The Indians there generally live in peace, quietly pursuing trade and agricultural employments, and giving the general government no trouble. Like those in New York, they have their churches, their schools, their native teachers and many other privileges of more favored communities.

The remaining tribes, West of the Father of Waters, are chiefly uncivilized, pursuing a wild and wandering life. Many of them have been injured in years past by the government's appropriation of too much money, instead of agricultural implements and seeds that might have led them to cultivate more extensively the lands reserved for them. With too free an allowance of ready cash, they are tempted to buy ardent spirits and other articles that the whites are but too ready to sell them, but which lead to dissipation and to an idle life. The average annual expenditure on Indian account is now \$3,055,270 08, not an extravagant sum, when we consider the number of the Indians yet remaining, and the vast obligations that we are under to them, owing to the extensive domain, stretching from the Atlantic to the Pacific, we have received from them at a nominal price. And then, we are constantly adding to our public lands by new treaties with the Indians. Of these, twelve in number, ten are with fifty tribes and bands in Washington Territory and Oregon, embracing about 19,000 Indians, and by which their title is extinguished in an extent of country amounting to 58,902,770 acres, at a cost of about five and three-fifths cents per acre. This is about the usual price paid to the Indians for land. Thus the government gets a profit, if it sells, at what is considered the low price of \$1 25 per acre. The profit may seem larger than it is to the reader, who forgets that the government is at great expense in removing the Indians and in protecting the frontier settlements.

There is still trouble with the Indians in Utah. First and last they have murdered hundreds of emigrants, who were peacefully crossing the country. This has gone on to the failure of their crops, in part, and partly because they were urged on by the fanatical whites of the Territory.
