Pacific Railroad.

We stated a few weeks ago that several propositions would be made in Congress on the subject of establishing Railroad lines across the continent from the Atlantic slope to the Pacific coast.

It is now understood that a bill has been framed for presentation in Congress, granting a charter for a Pacific Railroad and Telegraph to the Southern Pacific Railroad Company.

This is a corporation already chartered by the State of Texas. Hon. JAMES GUTHRIE, of Kentucky, late Secretary of the Treasury, and J. EDGAR THOMPSON, President of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, are Directors of this Southern Pacific Road.

The substance of the scheme embraced in the proposed charter is, for the Texas Company to build a railroad and telegraph to the Pacific on the Texas route, receiving therefor very extensive grants of land in the shape of alternate sections along the line.

The bill also embraces propositions of the same character to build another Railroad and Telegraph from the Missouri river to the Pacific on any route north of the 38th parallel of latitude.

If there is nothing objectionable in the details of this bill, it is to be hoped that it will pass Congress, and that under the operation of its provisions will be carried to the shores of the Pacific.

From Chambersburg to Harrisburg.

There is an erroneous opinion entertained by many persons in regard to the recent movement at Fayetteville, for the extension of the Gettysburg Railroad to Chambersburg which for the sake of brevity may be styled the Caladonia Railroad.

The Baltimore trade had been carried over the tracks in wagons until the construction of the Baltimore and Susquehanna R. R. since the opening of that road, it has been sent over the Gettysburg route, the Harrisburg, for the simple reason that a long haul is better than a short Turnpike.

The extension of the Railroad to Gettysburg has opened a direct Railroad connection with the Eastern Cities, which is the shortest route for produce, &c. of Franklin to be shipped to market.

From Fayetteville on the Caladonia route, there is a fine natural route for the location of a Railroad to Waynesboro, which on account of its connection with the County seat, its easy grades and straight line, may yet prove the cheapest and most practicable route to that wealthy and enterprising section of the valley.

But no place is so much interested in the construction of the Caladonia Road, as Chambersburg, and as that hateful stereotyped idea of having the monopoly of a railroad terminates, has at last been destroyed—the relaying of the Franklin Railroad has panicked that bubble—and the delusion that the trade must come to Chambersburg, and by which the public have so long been lulled into a quiet indifference, has of late been dispelled, by falling the trade passing off to other roads, the people are awakening to their interests; they find that Chambersburg with its present population, and with its manufactures in steel, iron, wood, &c. has as much need now of another railroad as it had years ago, need of more than one stage line.

In conclusion let it be distinctly understood that the present movement is merely a step toward the construction of a railroad that will be advantageous to all parties of this county, and let it be remembered that the Southern Pennsylvania Railroad route of which this Caladonia project is but a link is no new thing—only had it been used by nature through the mountain long before Farmer's Path was blazed, or his wagon road was macadamized, but also it contemplated a feasible railroad route, shortly after the introduction of railroading.
